Northern Ireland War Memorial StoryMaps for Junior Cycle History Curriculum

INTRODUCTION

These learning resources have been designed to highlight how the Northern Ireland War Memorial's *StoryMaps* can be used to address *Junior Cycle* history curriculum in fulfilling the learning objectives across three strands of study; *The Nature of History, The History of Ireland* & *The History of Europe and the wider world.*

These StoryMaps focus on 6 key themes;

- Smuggling
- Americans
- Blitz
- Evacuation
- Industry
- Victory

Use these StoryMaps to carry out the recommended activities individually or in groups both in class or as further learning at home. These activities have been designed to allow students the opportunity to develop key skills across 4 key areas; *Being Creative, Being Literate, Communication & Managing Information and thinking.*

Activity:

Write a diary entry imagining your wartime trip to Dublin.

Use the smuggling StoryMap to listen to first-hand accounts of rationing and smuggling and its affect on people both North and South of the border.

- Did you bring anything to friends or family in Eíre?
- Did you see the tourist sights, have dinner in a restaurant without coupons?
- Did you smuggle anything home what did you bring and how did you hide it from the Customs Officers?
- How do you think you would have felt having 'a break' from the war?

Activity:

Write and perform a dramatic monologue imagining how you celebrated Victory.

Use the Victory StoryMap and other StoryMaps to listen to the first hand experiences to gain an insight into what the Second World War was like for people and imagine how they would have felt celebrating Victory.

- Consider if they have loved ones overseas who would be finally returning home or had they been killed in actions?
- How did they celebrate, perhaps they went to Belfast City Hall or attended a street party, bonfire or stand down parade?
- How would you feel after nearly 6 years of war, worry and restrictions like rationing?

Activity:

Work in pairs to discuss and debate wartime agriculture and industry of Northern Ireland – imagine one of you is a farmer and the other an industrialist.

Use the Industry StoryMap and listen to the first hand experience to gain an insight into how industry and agriculture was affected by the war.

- Consider how the war has affected industry or agriculture (for the worse or better).
- For farming you may want to consider the effect of labour shortages and tillage quotas.
- While for industry you should think about air raids and material shortages.
- Get your audience to decide which of you made the most convincing arguments for your cause was industry or agriculture affected more by the Second World War?

- Consider how they felt were they scared? Defiant? Angry?
